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In 1986, Henri Landwirth created a whimsical Village imagined from the pages of a fairy tale; and for 36 years, families from around the globe have written their own unique chapters into the chronicles of Give Kids The World. Every star in the Castle of Miracles has a story, and this is the story of how Gabby Schweigert's star came to be placed among the beautiful galaxy of miracles and memories.

Ever since meeting in high school, Cody and Stephanie Schweigert dreamt of starting a family together. Five years later, their happily-everafter began with a joyful wedding – but their storybook ending was years in the making. A lengthy battle with infertility brought heartache and disappointment as they endured multiple miscarriages, surgeries and invasive therapies. After each new pregnancy, they added to the nursery, waiting for a child to love.

Just as the Schweigerts' optimism began to wane, fate intervened. A conversation at work about foster care sparked an epiphany: Cody and Stephanie were destined to provide a loving home for a child in need. They transformed the nursery into an older child's bedroom, and began the exhaustive process of becoming licensed for foster care. They studied, trained and interviewed, and within a year had completed certification. And then they waited...and waited.

"I had married the man of my dreams, and we had a safe and loving home available," says Stephanie. "Waiting for the phone to ring was excruciating, but we knew in our hearts there was a plan for us. We were meant to be parents." At last, the foster agency called; nine-year-old Jasmine needed a temporary home. Stephanie was on the phone and missed the call, and by the time she called back just five minutes later, Jasmine had already been placed. The couple was distraught until destiny once again stepped in. Jasmine's placement had not worked out, and she urgently needed a home. The Schweigerts were ecstatic as they welcomed Jasmine into the family, and Jasmine was overjoyed. Everything seemed to have fallen into place.

"The day of the adoption was the best day of our lives," says Stephanie. "Second best was our unforgettable week at Give Kids The World, which marked the beginning of our lives as a forever family. We were blown away by how welcoming and carring everyone was, and how inclusive and accessible the

Village is; it was nothing but laughter, healing and joy. All of us were breated like royalty, and Gabby was breated like just a kid-not a kid with a critical illness. We will never forget our life-changing experience." One night, Stephanie overheard Jasmine praying. She was surprised to learn that Jasmine had two sisters in foster care, including a twin with a critical illness. Jasmine prayed to one day be reunited. The Schweigerts were heartbroken to hear about the girls' separation, and profoundly moved when the agency described the trauma the sisters had suffered: physical and emotional abuse, severe neglect and homelessness. Cody and Stephanie wondered if they were capable of giving three children the care and attention they needed...but they knew they had to try. They arranged for a sleepover with all three girls, and by the end of the evening it was clear the girls needed to stay together.

A week later, Jasmine's dream came true when her twin and spina bifida warrior, Izabelle, and younger sister, Ella, moved in with the Schweigerts. The couple's truck was exchanged for a minivan, and garage sale excursions helped prepare their home for a growing family. Bliss quickly set in. However, the agency cautioned Cody and Stephanie not to get too attached to the girls. As members of the Tlingit and Haida indigenous tribes of Alaska, the sisters were protected by the Indian Child Welfare Act, making adoption by non-tribal parents nearly impossible.

"Even knowing this, we wanted to share our home, love and support with the girls for however long they needed it," says Stephanie.

Over the next several months, the Schweigerts' lives were filled with doctors' appointments and treatments for Izabelle; trauma-focused therapy for all three girls; and a litany of visits with social workers, attorneys and therapists to ensure the sisters were getting the best care and support possible. As time went on, the girls thrived; Izabelle advanced from crawling to walker and then crutches. The girls excelled in their new schools. And the Schweigerts became a family determined to stay together.

With a team of social workers, doctors, teachers and lawyers advocating on their behalf, the Schweigerts petitioned for adoption as the tribes searched for a Native American foster family. After two years of court dates and legal battles, an impassioned letter from the Schweigerts promising to honor the girls' indigenous heritage led tribal leaders to grant their consent; and on August 18, 2020, all three girls were legally adopted. As part of the adoption process, each of the girls chose a new first name, as their old names held





so much trauma. Jasmine became Jazalyn; Ella became Elsa; and Izabelle became Gabriella (Gabby.) Soon after the adoption, Gabby learned that her wish to visit Give Kids The World would be granted through the nonprofit Wishes & More of Minnesota.

"The day of the adoption was the best day of our lives," says Stephanie. "Second best was our unforgettable week at Give Kids The World, which marked the beginning of our lives as a forever family. We were blown away by how welcoming and caring everyone was, and how inclusive and accessible the Village is; it was nothing but laughter, healing and joy. All of us were treated like royalty, and Gabby was treated like just a kid – not a kid with a critical illness. We will never forget our life-changing experience."

On their last day at the Village, the Schweigerts enjoyed one more treat at Henri's Starlite Scoops and visited Gabby's star in the Castle of Miracles. As they prepared to leave, it occurred to Cody and Stephanie that the magic didn't have to end; Give Kids The World was where they were meant to be. A few months after arriving back home in Minnesota, the Schweigerts packed up and moved to Central Florida so they can volunteer helping other families create unforgettable memories at the Village.

"We will always be grateful to the Village for providing our family with such happiness – and for helping us discover the possibilities of what a grand move to Florida could look like, close to a place that means so much to all of us," says Cody. "Give Kids The World really is the stuff that dreams are made of."



Give Kids The World Founder Henri Landwirth was humble and selfless; but when it came to securing support for the Village, he was unapologetically dogmatic. Jason Fontaine, president of Central Moving & Storage (CMS) interstate agent for Wheaton World Wide Moving, laughs when he recounts Henri's power of persuasion.

"Henri called my father, CMS Owner Jim Fontaine, in the early '90s asking for help with some villa installations. Jim took some information and promised to get back to him with pricing. Henri kindly explained that he was not looking for a price, but rather someone to donate their time and expertise to a cause that impacts countless families in need," says Jason. After researching the Village, Jim and CMS enthusiastically came on board as one of the Village's Founding Partners – and have been moving mountains in support of wish families ever since.

Together, Wheaton | Bekins and its network of independently owned moving companies have supported Give Kids The World Village in innumerable ways, including providing complimentary storage space and delivery services, such as the annual delivery of goodies from the Sweets & Snacks Expo; raising funds through the annual Wheaton | Bekins silent auction, employee giving, and fundraising events such as the 2021 Truck Pull in Nashville; engaging employees to volunteer; and helping to orchestrate programs like Extreme Village Makeover.



"Some of us who are sick may never grow up and become old," Keaton said, "But for just this one special week out of our lives, the world is given to us. Give Kids The World was one of the happiest times of my life; everywhere you go, vou get a chance to see what life is like when you are important. It is not. pity me because I am sick, but because I count. My life counts and it does matter that I am here and alive. I hope other wish families have the chance to experience the love we were given at the Village."

Wheaton | Bekins Chairman of the Board Stephen F. Burns was among those at the conference deeply moved by Keaton's remarks. "Hearing Keaton speak, it touched your soul to know how much he'd been through and what Give Kids The World Village meant to him and his family," he said. Shortly after his speech, Keaton lost his battle with cancer. Inspired by Keaton's courage, optimism and passion for Give Kids The World, in

2004 Wheaton | Bekins built a therapeutic horseback riding venue at the Village and named it Keaton's Korral in honor of this special young man whose short but meaningful life impacted so many. 




EXTREME VILLAGE MAKEOVER II
